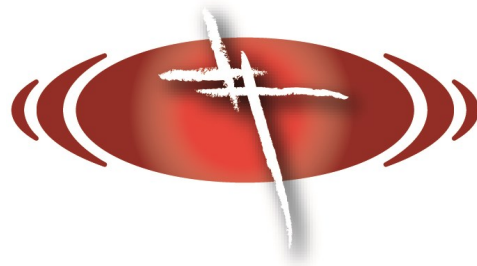

Dear Pilgrim members and friends,

As the quote above makes clear, Easter means everything to the followers of Christ! Without the Resurrection of Jesus, the Christian faith has no power, no purpose and no hope.

But there is hope – there is great hope for us, because there is absolutely no defeat with Jesus of Nazareth! Setbacks? Yes. Disappointments? Yes. Discouragement? Yes. Death? Of course; it’s the logical conclusion to earthly existence. But we should remember that these are all things of this world – things caused by sin and evil. The Resurrection is our joyful reminder that all the ugly forces that seek to destroy and defeat us in this world are all subject to Christ’s power, made known to us in His Resurrection.

Ironically, the resurrection of Jesus came as a complete surprise to the first disciples. Why is there irony in that? – Because Jesus had talked directly and quite openly with his followers about his forthcoming death and resurrection (See Mark 8:31-32). Jesus spelled it out fully and completely. And either it didn’t sink in, or they simply couldn’t accept the possibility of his death, or his death was so personally disappointing and even

devastating for them that they were ill-prepared for what would follow.



The surprise and even shock of Jesus’ resurrection quickly turned into astonishment, elation, and finally into determined and committed faith. The resurrection became a lens through which the disciples were able to see with clarity and conviction the teachings and actions of Jesus. The resurrection made all the difference for those first followers of Jesus – just as it has for followers of Jesus down through the centuries, and for followers of Jesus even today!

On Sunday, April 5th, we’ll celebrate The Resurrection of Our Lord, but that event is too significant to be limited to a single day of festivity and faith! The Easter season is fully seven Sundays – April 5, 12, 19, 26, May 3, 10, and 17 – and concludes on the Day of Pentecost, May 24th. Let’s come together in worship as often we are able in the next two months to share our joy and jubilation! He is risen! He is risen, indeed!

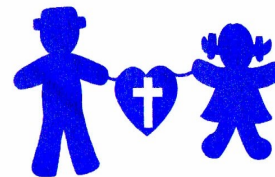

Our summer day camp program will be in operation for five weeks this year. We have a variety of options: There will be children who come the regular five day week, but we are also offering

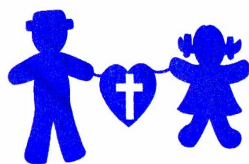


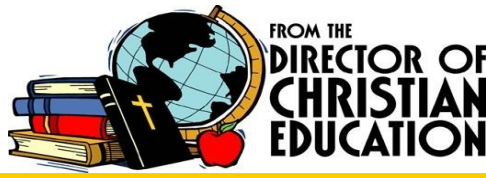

Week three takes us 'Under the Sea' and on week four we will be on a 'Safari'. Our last week is our favorite 'God Bless America'. We can hardly wait for all of the fun activities! Elder's Corner

Having the privilege to write this month's Elder's Corner is my honor. Lent is so important for all us Christians. On March 29th we celebrated Palm Sunday while on April 2nd we continue our walk through Holy Week. Please focus on Maundy Thursday highlighting those events our Savior had to face for us during this special week and that specific day.

Maundy Thursday represents the beginning of the Jewish year, the Feast of Unleavened Bread or the Feast of Passover. This Feast is intended to remind the Jewish people of the time when God preserved the first born of the Israelites while the other first born were killed. This all occurred while the Jews were slaves in Egypt. The Passover as defined and handed down by Moses is mentioned numerous times in the old and new testaments of the Bible.

On this special day we begin with Jesus instructing his disciples how and where they will prepare the Passover Feast. The anointed Jesus knows where the disciples will find the owner of the room required for the feast. Christ also knows the room is available and the owner will allow Jesus and his disciples to use the room that evening. Jesus the man and God the Son tells those in attendance that one of them will betray him this evening. This causes all in attendance to question, "Surely not I?" This evening is very special to all Christians because the Son of God presents another means of grace. For the forgiveness of our sins he offers us Holy Communion. The sharing of his body and blood is a sacrament and a holy meal for all Christians to enjoy fellowship together.

Jesus the Son of God can see the coming events while Jesus the man struggles with the path in front of him. The dutiful son wants to discuss this heavy situation with his Heavenly Father while Jesus the man wants his friends to support him. However just prior to his prayer with the Holy Father he must tell his friend Peter that before this night is over Peter will tell others he does not know this man Jesus of Nazareth. He will deny knowing Jesus not only once but a total of three times. This loss of friends had to be very difficult for Jesus the man but remains as part of God's plan.

Jesus possessing a very heavy heart now travels to the Mount of Olives or Gethsemane with his friends. He asks his friends to wait and watch with him while he prays and talks with his Heavenly Father. God the Son knows the events of this evening and the impact it will have. God the Son knows that he will be mocked, beaten, crucified and die within the next 16 to 18 hours. In his prayer to his Heavenly Father he questions if there is another way. In the end he knows the answer and as a dutiful son he starts on the "Painful Planned Path." Within moments he twice returns to his dear friends to find them sleeping. Now the Son of man begins to feel total separation. Just as Jesus tells the disciples it is time to go he also warns them it is the moment for his betrayer to present himself. His mental pain and separation must be weighing heavily on our Savior now.

Judas the betrayer appears and with a kiss identifies Christ signaling the hand-over to the hoodlums sent from the chief priests and other Jewish leaders. The remainder of the evening Jesus is questioned by first the chief priests, elders and teachers of Jewish law and later by the local Roman government. Initially Jesus is with the members of the Sanhedrin where they ask, "Are you the Christ, the son of the Blessed One?" Jesus with brevity and strength of statement answers these Jewish religious leaders. "I am, and you will see the Son of Man sitting at the right hand of the Mighty One and coming on the clouds of heaven." With that the High Priest is angered tearing his cloths claiming Jesus is speaking lies. Think about this, a mortal man is calling the Son of God a liar. Since the Jewish leaders cannot administer capital punishment Jesus is sent to a local Roman leader that can sentence Jesus – Pilate, the Roman Governor.

In the Gospel of Luke we are told Jesus was sent before Herod because Jesus is believed to be a Galilean thus Herod's responsibility. Herod was pleased to see Jesus and expecting Jesus to do some miracles. However Jesus does not respond to questions or requests. At this point Jesus is mocked and dressed in a royal robe and sent back to Pilate again accompanied by some members of the Sanhedrin. Again Jesus appears in front Pilate. Pilate's actions indicate he does not want to rule on Jesus punishment. While Pilate is positioned to render a decision on Jesus' fate he receives a message from his wife declaring Jesus to be innocent of any crime. With pressure from the Chief Priest on one side and Pilate believing Jesus to be innocent, Pilate is seeking a way out of his dilemma. Pilate even tries to gain support from the citizens of Jerusalem suggesting an option of releasing Jesus or releasing proven criminal named Barabbas.

As we know the people of Jerusalem with the help of members of the Sanhedrin made the wrong choice by demanding for the release of Barabbas.

Jesus is now is convicted to be executed on a Roman cross. As mortal humans we see this innocent man being put to death for what we have done not his actions. During this day and prior to his death Jesus has full knowledge of his fate - being mocked, beaten, betrayed, separated from loved ones, disgraced, humiliated and finally death. This blameless man from Nazareth did all this for you and me and is truly our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ but this is only the beginning of this beautiful story of salvation.

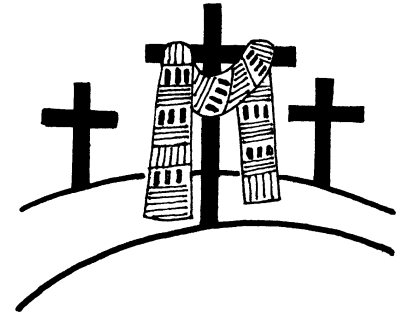
