This is the way God has approached the problem of evil. God knows that the law has not change the human heart or restore one's humanity. That is done only through the grace of God available through Jesus our Lord.

#### PIPE ORGAN UPDATE



Considerable progress has recently been reported in the building of our new organ at John Paul Buzard Organ Company in Champaign, Illinois. As of 5/31/16, the console wood cabinet has been constructed and is being assembled, next step being wood staining/finishing. All the pipes, the electrical system components, and the blower have arrived in Illinois. Multiple wind-chest units are assembled/being assembled. Overall, the pieces to this fantastic instrument are coming together and the organ remains "on schedule" for installation at Pilgrim beginning January 2017. # CALL COMMITTEE UPDATE

## AN UPDATE FOR YOU...

"What is happening in our search for a new pastor?" If you have asked that question, you are not alone. The process of searching for and calling a new spiritual leader is a detailed endeavor that requires the input of ALL members of a congregation. As we at Pilgrim are aware, pastors can serve a congregation for 10-20 years, and selecting the "right" person for that position is a very important process that can take several months, even stretching to a year or more.

#### Several steps have already been completed:

- Once Pastor Al announced his retirement date of April 17<sup>th</sup>, Bishop Gafkjen met with our Council President Greg Rexing and the Board of Directors about transition plans
- Greg then put out a request for Pilgrim members willing to serve on a call committee to assemble the information needed to thoroughly search for and interview a new pastor. From that group of 12 volunteers, another request was made for 2-3 people to form a Discovery Team to lead the process of filling out the Ministry Site Profile (MSP)
- Assistant to the Bishop Rudy Mueller met with Greg and representatives of the Board of Elders and Board of Directors to further discuss the transition process and work toward finding an interim pastor. Pastor Chuck Miller was called and put in place as interim pastor for Pilgrim in May of 2016

What now? The Discovery Team, consisting of Frank Bates, Tammy Donley, and Chris Konow, met with Pastor Nancy Nyland from the Indiana-Kentucky Synod to begin the process of collecting information for the MSP. This document is a complete look at our congregation: Why do we exist, and for whom? What would someone from the outside see as our purpose and mission? What are we good at? What areas do we want to improve? What does our neighborhood need right now, and how are we helping fill that need? What is the mission of Pilgrim and how are we fulfilling that mission? All of these questions and many more need to be answered truthfully from discussions with people from all areas of our church.

Your honest input is vital to completing this task. In the coming months, small discussion groups will meet to get a comprehensive look at our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and barriers to our growth as a congregation. An online survey will be available to gather information about congregation demographics and feelings about various church positions. Meetings with community leaders and service providers will help us assess the needs of our community and where Pilgrim can help fill those needs. All information will be compiled to create an accurate picture of our feelings as a congregation in order to find the best match for our current situation and future needs. The goal is not to paint a perfect picture, rather an accurate picture of our congregation for potential pastoral candidates.

If you have any questions about the discovery process, please do not hesitate to call your Discovery Team members or Council President. Look for further updates in Pilgrim's Progress, weekly bulletins, and on the narthex video screen.

## **"From the Elders"**



## The Look of Love

Jesus, when asked by one of the Pharisees which was the greatest commandment in the Law, responded by quoting from Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18, " 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." The Pharisees, who had classified more than 600 laws, often tried to distinguish the more important from the less important. Most of the time these laws started with, "Thou shalt not..." By his response Jesus not only avoided the Pharisee's trap, he also reaffirmed the importance of the Scriptures over "the traditions of men." Jesus always faced his most difficult situations by going straight to the Scriptures, which he had known since childhood. Although Jesus himself *was* the Word Incarnate, he was also strengthened and comforted by them. The Scriptures are not just a collection of heavenly do's and don'ts; they are not just available to language scholars. They are life for God's people and the story they tell is the greatest love story ever written. From beginning to end, Jesus is the central character, and in the midst of every drama and story, he can be found bringing God's mercy, forgiveness, and compassion to a wayward people. In these stories we find God's great love revealed.

In John 1:14 the apostle tells us that Jesus, the Word made flesh, came from the Father "full of grace and truth." In verses 16-17, John writes, "From the fullness of his grace we have all received one blessing after another. For the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ." Before he died Jesus prayed to the Father for his disciples saying, "For I gave them the words you gave me. I pray for them... Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth." (Vs. 8, 9, 17) Over and over again, Jesus demonstrated the importance the Scriptures played in his life and ministry. Over and over as we read them, the Scriptures reveal God's love for us in his Son. In the Old Testament we catch glimpses of Jesus present from the beginning of God's redemptive calendar, from Genesis to Malachi. In the New Testament, we see the fulfillment of his plan in the life of Christ, the picture of what God's love looks like in action.

It has often been said that God's love cannot be captured in the single word *love*. It is too often misapplied and abused in our culture to refer to the most inane situations: "Don't you just love this dress?" "I really love your new house!" Or, even in what we find as the emotional response to our human nature's need for community: "But dad, even though we only just met, I really love the guy!" The Beatles sang, "Love, love, love, all we ever need is love" and the Sergio Mendes and Brazil '66 song extolled "the look of love that's in your eyes." Love can be described in the most sentimental trivialities. I actually have a little painted plaque hanging in my bathroom with this sentiment decorated (in red, to match my towels!) on it: " 'What is the color of love?' she asked, dipping her hand in the paint. And he quickly replied in a whispered tone, 'Love is the color of music and light. Love is the gypsy dance on a sailing ship of dreams.' " REALLY? At the cross, God's love ran red, and my sin washed white.

In truth, the look of love can be messy and it is best captured as a verb, rather than a noun: a mother giving birth, an adult child cleaning up after his Alzheimer's stricken father has lost his bowel control, a wife caring for her paralyzed husband; the gory sufferings and death of an Innocent who "was made to be sin, who knew no sin," to pay the price for us to a holy and just God. God's love, which is born of the Spirit, is not sentimental, nor can it be understood as a feeling. Christ clarified for all time the greatest commands were love of God and love for one another. Unfortunately, he didn't give us specifics about what that love should look like. Instead he gives us the story of that love in chapter after chapter of the Greatest Love Story ever written.

Even in our most noble aspirations, our human nature cannot touch the depth of love the Father has shown to us. Even when our hearts are breaking for the injustice and damage done to our fellow man, we cannot imagine the pain done to the Father's heart over our lack of love. Some would say that the opposite of love is hatred. I disagree. If God is love, and He so *loved* the world that He *gave* His only begotten Son...I think the opposite of love is selfishness. Yes, hatred kills, steals, and destroys, but selfishness means that we don't even deem the other as worthy of our notice. We make people unnecessary when we are selfish. It's like they don't even matter enough to rouse our emotions.

What is the look of God's love? We see it in the Scriptures in the way Jesus gathered the little children in his arms, in the way he gathered the woman caught in adultery, protecting her, forgiving her, and even in his parting words, "Go, and sin no more," he offered her hope. If ever we want to know how to love as Jesus loves, go to the Scriptures. Read the Old Testament book of Hosea. See how God loves the unfaithful "wife" and pursues her with his love. Read the story of Jonah and see how God moves to bring his people where they can thrive, even in spite of themselves. Look at John 13:1-15 to see the picture of love Jesus left his disciples as he washed their feet: "Having loved his own who were in the world, he now showed them the full extent of his love. 'Do you understand what I have done for you?' he asked them. 'You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you.' "

C.H. Spurgeon, a 19<sup>th</sup> century British pastor and author, wrote in his devotional material, "The New Testament contains Jesus Christ's letters to us, which are perfumed by His love. These pages are like the garments of our King, and they all bear His fragrance. The essence of the Word of God is Christ." May we all come to know and love His Word so well that, when we daily meet Him there, we may carry His fragrance into the world.
