

# Kid's Corner...from Mrs. Worth:

Are you full of hot air? When someone says that to another they are usually implying the person inflates the truth or adds to their story to make it sound extra special. However, in May we celebrated Pentecost...the very special, miraculous day when the Holy Spirit came to Jesus' disciples and friends to breathe upon them and inspire them to know and tell God's message of love and forgiveness. So how do we know we too are full of the Holy Spirit? God's word tells us about this in Acts 2...this chapter is full of drama and excitement, be sure to read it or have someone in your family read it with you. The bible words to describe the Holy Spirit coming are: *Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest upon them* Acts 2 2-3. So there you have it, the Holy Spirit came and filled them with hot air! But this is not inflated air rather air that inspires and helps. Think of it this way. A deflated balloon offers very little of anything. What can one do with a balloon without air? But blow up the balloon and then you have something to enjoy (hang it as a decoration, bat it around, or play

indoor volleyball). We cannot see the air just as we cannot see the Holy Spirit within us but we do know the air is there because the balloon has changed, it looks different. We too can know and trust God's word that the Holy Spirit is within us, changing us to be better disciples of Jesus. So rejoice you are full of Hot Air...the power of the Holy Spirit within you fills you with power, helps you to speak about Jesus and claims you as God's children.

# **Eder's Corner** "A Sense of Urgency" "From the Elders" Message for June 2015 – by Susie Pike

### "As long as it is day, we must do the works of Him who sent Me. Night is coming when no one can work." John 9:4

"Jesus had a sense of urgency. Not a frantic pace without purpose, but a focused diligence on doing God's work. He prayerfully sought to steward each day with an eve on eternity. He did not allow criticism to distract Him in defensiveness or praise to fuel His pride in superior thinking. Rather, Jesus knew He was on a mission for His Father..." (Extract from *Wisdom Hunters*, June 2014)

These are words from a daily devotional dated exactly one year ago that I had recorded in my journal with my thoughts about this "urgency" that Jesus exhibits in this Scripture passage. This mission that He had been sent to accomplish in the three short years of His public ministry was nothing less that the ushering in of the Kingdom of God, and His purpose was the redemption and restoration of all of creation to the their original purposes. This is, as C.S. Lewis wrote, "the only thing we were made for... to be shown how we can be drawn into Christ – can become part of that wonderful present which the young Prince of the universe wants to offer His Father which is Himself and therefore us in Him."

I, too, feel that the Holy Spirit has been speaking, not only to me, but also to Christians from every nation and denomination, concerning this great urgency to be about doing the work of God. One only has to pick up a newspaper, turn on the television, or check their devices' news feeds to appreciate the great suffering of creation as it "groans in birth pangs" waiting for the redemption of the world. And why does it always seem to be the least, the poorest, the unprotected who seem to bear the brunt of sin in our world? Is it any coincidence that there are thousands of references in the Scriptures, both Old and New, to caring for the least and the lost? Does it not seem intentional that, while Jesus walked the earth, He made so many statements about caring for the poor, eating with the marginalized (a very risky behavior in His time), specifically seeking the least and the lost, and setting captives free from their slavery to sin? If Jesus spent so much of His time doing these things that He "heard from the Father," does it not make it clear what is on our Father's heart? Isn't it true that Jesus lived this out because He knew it was fundamental to who God was? Jesus not only did these works Himself, but He also invites us, His followers, to do the same. And not only are we invited to join His mission, we have been empowered by the Holy Spirit to do His same works right now, with our baggage, with our fear, with our troubles, with our weakness, we can join Him right now. Jesus urged the Disciples – and His followers today - to pray for Workers.

"Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."" (Matthew 9:35-37)

As one of the elders at Pilgrim, I am charged with encouraging others to take part in this mission as well. So I ask the Spirit to guide us in answering this question: What are "the works of Him who sent Jesus" that we are to be doing in this place called Pilgrim Lutheran Church? We have been uniquely blessed over the sixty-plus years that we have existed as a congregation – what other modern church do you know of that was able to build a brand new facility in a brand new location without incurring the debt of a mortgage? I believe that God has continued to bless us partly because we have been good stewards of the gifts of talent and resources He has bestowed on us as a congregation. The history of the leadership here at Pilgrim shows that we have invested wisely and shared faithfully of His blessings of time, talent, and resources. But, as we have been reminded, "To whom much is given, much is required." So now we have been given another financial resource in the sale of - finally!! - the remainder of our original Meridian street property. We have the resources and the talent here at Pilgrim, so now we need the workers! That's what our "60 Days of Service" initiative is all about. We are asking that every Pilgrim member ask God to show them how they can get involved personally, in hands on participation, in doing the works of God.

Whenever a church embarks on fundraising or enlisting workers to ministry, there are always questions: "Given the magnitude of the needs, is there anything I could be a part of that would really make a difference? I could give \$100 to whatever that guy just talked about, but is it really going to change anything? And don't we have things that we need money for around here? I mean, isn't it really like throwing money into a black hole?" Won't there always be another earthquake in Nepal? Won't there always be inner city youth lost to rampant crime, without the resources or the necessary education to earn them? Won't there always be refugees willing to leave with nothing more than the clothes on their backs in order escape the horror of wars in Africa? Won't there always be evil people who rob and steal the lives of young people destroyed by the evils of human trafficking? "Is there anything I could do that is REALLY going to change anything?? And besides, what do I, having been raised in a white, upper-middle class family, with two parents who provided a safe environment for me to grow and learn, know about the needs of the truly needy and marginalized? I can't pretend that I "get it," that I understand all the issues that the poor face daily. What do the needy and marginalized even look like in my neighborhood and in my circles of influence?" The young and energetic associate pastor for urban impact at our son's former church in Maple Grove, Minnesota, once posed these same types of questions. And that was her fulltime ministry! As she said, "It's overwhelming sometimes. There are so many good things we can get involved in, so many causes to give to, so many campaigns to join. But why, when I look at all these programs, do I feel that, no matter what I do, no matter how much money I give, no matter what our church does, not much is really going to change. No one is going to end up, anywhere, different." A well-known Christian writer, Henri Nouwen, wrote, however, that *both* the donor *and* the receiver of donations are changed by the experience.

John tells us that, Jesus, as He encountered the multitudes, had compassion on them. Being one with the Father, He could see with the Father's eyes, and so when He looked at a person, He never saw a disease, or a condition, or a personality trait, because He always could see the big picture of their life; of their trial and their triumph, of their pain and their sorrow and their joy. And so we ask that we, too, "may have eyes to see, and ears to hear," and that, as converted, transformed people, we may be given a "spiritual vision" for caring for the poor and marginalized. In Henri Nouwen's little book entitled *The Spirituality of Fundraising*, he insists that fundraising as ministry, involves a real conversion. He is quoted as saying, "The converted person sees, hears, and understands with a divine eye, a divine ear, a divine heart." May each of us catch this vision as we consider how we may participate, and as we pray to the Lord of the harvest to send workers! What each of us is called to do may look different, because it will reflect our neighborhood and its culture, so there are no simplistic solutions, but we can each care for the poor and fight for justice in our own church, in our own community, in our own city. We have to ask ourselves, in our life, in our neighborhood, in our culture, what does poverty look like? Who are the under-protected and the overlooked in our midst?

Closing prayer: "God, we want to believe in Your love that changes the world, and in Your Spirit, in and through us, that this Spirit is put in us to be part of the solution on this earth. Please, help us to see the piece that You have for each of us as we look at some of these hard questions. Amen."
