If ever you find yourself on your phone, or reading a novel or watching TV, take a moment to appreciate everything that God has given us. Look around you. See the uniqueness of the world. Maybe even pray. Just so that you aren't wasting your life away with meaningless possessions that only bring temporary happiness. The life which we will be given will never end, and we should anticipate it by looking forward to what Christ has in store for us. I'm confident that all of us could find a point in our day in which we are just passing time, whether we be using our earthly possessions or not. In these times, we are able to look to the heavens and thank God for the eternal life he will give us.

So don't cut your possessions out of your lives. It is certainly useful and is good to take a break from reality now and then. But don't get too greedy. Each and every one of us has our own relationship with Jesus, and we should try our hardest to maintain it.
