WHAT'S UP IN WORSHIP? Have you noticed how the sharing of the peace has moved? We are now beginning our worship with this ancient ritual. In the twenty-first century it still feels good to be welcomed and greeted as we gather to worship, and this is a gracious way to help a first time visitor feel comfortable in our community. If you see someone you don't know, try to greet them and welcome them to worship.

This fall we have brought back an old liturgy setting the *Now the Feast Liturgy* by Marty Haugen. Many of you will remember how the youth choirs ROW and GAP led worship with this liturgy about twenty years ago. I am excited to play this liturgy again and this time adapt it to the organ with its variety of sounds (my favorite part is the Sanctus where I can pull out all the stops!) Themes of thankfulness, stewardship, and harvest run through this liturgy making it a lovely choice for autumn and the end of the Pentecost season where we give thanks for God's gifts to us and respond with our tithes and pledge commitments for 2019. To highlight the joyous feel of this liturgy we are doing continuous line communion at 10:45 a.m. worship. When Advent comes, we will return to kneeling to match the reverent and reflective nature of Advent. We will also change liturgy settings for Advent (one of my favorite parts of my job is pondering which liturgy seems to best match the upcoming liturgical season for us), so stay tuned!

**TODAY is the 501<sup>st</sup> anniversary of the Reformation.** Last year, of course, Lutheran churches around the world held special worship services, hymn festivals, concerts, and programs. While perhaps not as "over the top" as last year (how else can you describe a fantastic hymn festival led by David Cherwien like what we experienced last year?) Today we remember Martin Luther's courage to stand up for his beliefs and his tenacity in upending medieval beliefs about God's grace and purpose in the lives of ordinary believers. As a result, today we know God's grace is free to all who believe. and is not dependent on our good works. Our good works are a thankful response to God's blessings in our lives.

On All Saints Sunday, November 4, our worship will celebrate the lives of those who have passed away in the past year as well as celebrate how we are sinners but also saints through God's grace and forgiveness. Look for aspects of this service that remind you of Easter. (A big hint...start with the prelude - I hope to sing the Mozart Alleluia). (Sarah Williams)

**ADULT BIBLE CLASS**—Dr. Fred Niedner will conclude a four-week study "Birth and Rebirth in the Bible." The adult class will meet at 9:30 a.m. Today's study is **Born from Above (Birth Metaphors in the New Testament)** 

Wisdom, Reality and Erotica await all Pilgrim adults willing to venture into the Bible Study classroom (on 2<sup>nd</sup> floor east) at 9:30 a.m. on November 4. That's when Lynn Willis will begin a 5-week study of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and the Song of Solomon, the so-called "Wisdom Books" of the Bible. The authorship of all three books has traditionally been ascribed to King Solomon, and the rabbis of old said, undoubtedly with a twinkle in their eyes, that Solomon wrote the Song of Solomon in amorous youth, Proverbs in seasoned middle age, and Ecclesiastes in disillusioned old age. None of these books gets much attention in our weekly lectionary or preaching, but Martin Luther spoke of Ecclesiastes. for example, as "this very beautiful and useful book," which "on many counts deserves to be in everyone's hands and to be familiar to everyone." It is said, as well, that in the 12<sup>th</sup> Century, Bernard of Clairvaux wrote 86 sermons on the Song of Solomon and never got past the third chapter! Indeed, the erotic poetry of the Song of Solomon, at first reading, seems more suited to a steamy romance novel than to Holy Writ. But, Luther and Bernard, among others, saw what modern interpreters and preachers do not: that these three books can provide the careful reader training in the daily life of faith and can stir the human heart to devotion. Come and find out for yourself what these amazing books of poetry say to you about life's realities, illusions, and promises.
